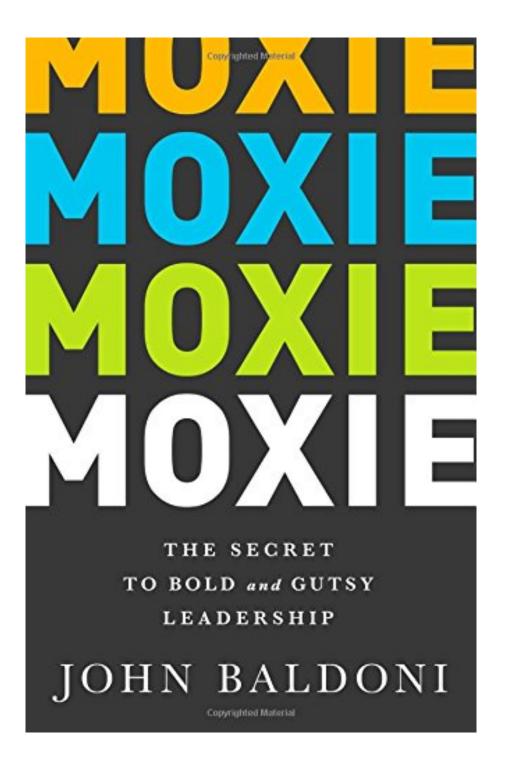

John Baldoni takes a different approach. Through the voices and experiences of highly successful leaders from all kinds of organizations, Baldoni tells us how a leader must be to be successful. He calls this having MOXIE, which stands for:

• Mindfulness... having an awareness of oneself that is informed by others; an awareness of the present while preparing for the future

- Opportunity... recognizing needs and wanting to meet those needs
- X-Factor knowing what you believe and can do that make you unique
- Innovation... willing to embrace doing something new and to keep trying even in the face of failure
- Engagement... believing that you will be successful by helping others be successful

Baldoni tells us about a wide range of leaders who have demonstrated MOXIE, from Nelson Mandela to Ben Hogan to Margaret Thatcher to Sergio Marchionne to Dolly Parton. Although quite different leadership experiences, all of them were very successful in their fields. These examples serve to make the point that regardless of situation, whether playing professional sports, surviving injustice, governing a nation, running a multinational company, or being a superstar entertainer, MOXIE is the common denominator.

As in his previous books, Baldoni shows his adeptness at using stories to make a point. And this use of stories is what makes this book so engaging and useful. He makes the qualities of an exceptional leader accessible to all people who aspire to a leadership role in their organizations.
